

IN the summer of 1886, an exciting new adventure story was serialised in Young Folks magazine. Since then, readers young and old have been enthralled by Robert Louis Stevenson's Kidnapped, first published 130 years ago.

And to mark the anniversary, three intrepid adventurers set out to re-enact the epic trek by David Balfour and Alan Breck, raising money for Parkinson's UK, Ocean Youth Trust Scotland and Stevenson Adventures.

From South Queensferry they set sail in the trimaran Trade Winds, skippered by Richard Marshall, on the Kidnapped route taken by the brig Covenant round the top of Scotland to Earraid.

From there Alan Rankin and Willie Gibson, both experienced hill runners, set off on foot at a brisk pace, crossing Mull in two days and Morvern in a day.

At Kentallen the club's Stevenson Way expert Ian Logan met them and they walked to Lettermore, scene of the murder of the 'Red Fox' Colin Campbell.

Then round the back of Glencoe to Signal Rock, where Ian took the reverse route to meet them as they came off the hill. But they were going at such a pace that he just sat down and made a cup of coffee as they vanished down the glen on the Flight in the Heather.

The following day miles of tarmac to Kinlochleven took their toll on feet but Alan and Willie carried on to Rannoch Moor and made Ben Alder cottage next day.

But one had suffered a foot injury and so at Loch Rannoch they made the difficult decision to take a break – as David and Alan did at Balquhidder. Latest news at www.kidnapped130.com or on Twitter: #BigSailWalk and @Kidnapped130.

IN the year of Kidnapped 130, the club ensured the sequel was not overlooked as members followed in the footsteps of David Balfour and Alan Breck on the Catriona Trail.

In Stevenson's novel Catriona, David and Alan leave Musselburgh early 'before the first ninepenny coach was due from Edinburgh for (as Alan said) that was a rencounter we might very well avoid. The wind although still high, was very mild, the sun shone strong, and Alan began to suffer in proportion.'

Club members made a more leisurely start to their walk led by Ian Gardiner, the driving force behind the Catriona Trail. On a beautiful morning we set out from Musselburgh's Fisherrow Harbour and followed the shore eastwards to the river Esk.

Once over the footbridge we passed the nature reserve complex created for bird populations of many marine species. Heading on we reached the ancient Morrison's Haven, once the port for local industry.

Further south lay the site of the Prestonpans battlefield where Alan fought in the victorious Jacobite army alongside Catriona's father James More Drummond. We had no time for a visit, although Alan insisted on giving David a tour: 'From Prestonpans he had me aside to the field of Gladsmuir, where he exerted himself a great deal more than needful to describe the stages of the battle.'

A little further along, we passed the home of another key figure in the Catriona story. Prestongrange House was once the home of William Grant, Lord Advocate of Scotland, and is now the headquarters of the Royal Musselburgh Golf Club.

As it was low-tide we could continue along the sea wall to Cockenzie Harbour, of which David Balfour said: 'Though they were building herring-busses [fishing boats] there at Mrs Cadell's, it seemed a desert-like, backgoing town, about half full of ruined houses; but the ale-house was clean, and Alan, who was now in a glowing heat, must indulge himself with a bottle of ale.'

Steering clear of ale houses, we made our way through a well-kept communal garden to Cockenzie House, which in David and Alan's day was the home of the Cadell family of 18th-century entrepreneurs.

We were welcomed there by the Cockenzie House and Gardens Trust, who gave us a presentation of its local history. After a late lunch at the Secret Garden Café at the house, we caught the bus back to Musselburgh.

Along the Loing with Louis

A NEW trail inspired by the French travels of Robert Louis Stevenson has been created by the Association RLS de Barbizon à Grez.

The 154 kilometre trail runs from Grez-sur-Loing to Châtillon-sur-Loire, the newest member of the European Network In the Footsteps of Robert Louis Stevenson, and follows the route taken by RLS and his friend Sir Walter Simpson in August 1875.

The trail was inaugurated in May by a group who hiked the stages along the Loing Valley from Grez, where RLS would meet Fanny Osbourne, to Châtillon, where he had a less happy encounter with the commissary of police.
